

Awards Luncheon

WHGC won six club and one individual award at the October 29 Federated Garden Clubs of Connecticut Awards luncheon.



The Club was awarded two Silver Tray Awards of Excellence: One for *Civic Development* (the disease-resistant Liberty Elm trees project) and other for *Garden Therapy* (specifically for our work at Elmgrove and West Hartford Health and Rehab.)



Susan Lindberg was awarded an Individual Certificate of Achievement for her for her outstanding contributions in *Garden Therapy*.

The Club was also awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Environmental Concerns and Conservation (*Reduce Reuse, Recycle Program*) and the Youth Award of Excellence (*Junior Gardeners* work with Hillcrest Area Neighborhood Outreach Center [HANOC].)

In addition, the Club received the *Yearbook Award of Excellence* for our 2013-2014 Yearbook.

In response to the *FGCCT President's Plant Native Trees Challenge*, we planted 150 native trees since April 2013. We received an award check for \$125, the money to be allocated at a later date. Civic Projects

Newer Club members may be wondering how the West Hartford Garden Club became so involved with the Noah Webster House, so here is a little history. The WHGC, an all volunteer organization, has no formal contractual agreement with NWH. However, the long term interest in gardening there dates from 1966 when the club was asked by the Board of Trustees of the NW Foundation to restore the grounds. The Club accepted enthusiastically. A former charter member, Mrs. Alice Hamilton who lived directly behind...had donated the property to the Town. In July of 1963 it was designated a National Historical Site by the US Department of the Interior." With the advice of the University of CT's Rudy Favretti, who drew up "an attractive design for the garden for a house of that type." The gardens were installed, and Club members began the" biweekly effort to keep the garden neat and tidy", continuing to do so for the next ten years as a Civic Project.

A museum addition was completed in August of 1974, for which 22 bayberry bushes were planted and sod laid by the Club, "in time" for the dedication. "From 1976-1980, a separate committee was formed to continue maintenance around the house and supply arrangements for the inside." Details of the Club's involvement since 1980 are not recorded in the 75th Diamond Jubilee History booklet, from which these quotes come. My guess is that, since many women were entering the workforce around that time, the WHGC, like many other female driven volunteer organizations, struggled with membership retention and prioritizing activities.

Under former Civic Projects co-chairs, Judy Carrithers and Claudie Blozy, and the urging of club member Louise Pruyne, now the property owner behind the NWH and an emeritus member of the NWH Board, the WHGC re-committed itself to helping maintain the Colonial era garden inside the maroon fence in a way that works for both members of the Club and for the teaching programs at NWH. As a sub-committee of Civic Projects, chair(s) were designated and a line item budget adopted, initially at \$ 500, but reduced to \$300 in the current year.



Current NWH co-chair, Jamie Wein, along with other Club members, Margaret Pulito, Susan Petty-Bailer, Louise Pruyne, and Jeanne Grandy met in August together with Town officials Helen Rubino-Turco and Al Adaskaveg and the new NWH Board chair, Diane Foley and newly appointed Executive Director of NWH, Jennifer Matos, to welcome her and begin a fresh conversation about how we can best support one another in caring for the NWH's garden. It was a fruitful time together, and we look forward to continuing the partnership. We are grateful for their support, and for allowing us the use of the Community Room for flower arranging sessions this year.

Discussion going forward will include the possibility of landscaping a patio space at the rear of the property as a Civic Project. Desire for the improved space stems from the expanded use of NWH as a resource center for groups and special events with need for beautification between NWH and the rear property; an identified need for increased safety for the children in programs there; and additional space for staff and visitors to sit outside.
